## **REPORT FROM THE PRESIDENT 2022–23**

The highlight has undoubtedly been the completion of the new exhibition in the Bolton Street Cemetery Museum opened by Councillor Nicola Young with Councillor Nikau Wi Neera on 31 October 2022. It is the culmination of three years' concentrated work led by Lara Simmonds, Trestle Creative, together with our Steering Committee. Awareness of these new displays since then has been promoted by many guided tours, with several enthusiastic responses received. ## SIGNIFICANT EXPANSION OF BOLTON STREET BURIAL LIST

The first known recorded burials in 1840 in the Wellington area are listed in the first Church of England register, now commonly known as the “St Paul’s Church Register” (but this church was not built until 1844). It is headed “Burials in the District of Port Nicholson” and is known to record many burials in the wider Wellington region. This possibly includes Cloudy Bay in the north of the South Island. (Unfortunately, the Church of England burial registers do not record the locations of burials, but after 1866 we can at least be sure they were somewhere within Bolton Street Cemetery).

There are 992 burials listed as having taken place between May 1840 and December 1866. Obviously most but not all would have been in Bolton Street Cemetery since the original St Paul’s Church was virtually across the road from the cemetery from 1844. A new register (titled “Church of England Burials in the District of Wellington”) was started in January 1867 after the opening of St Paul’s pro-Cathedral (“Old St Paul’s”). We can be certain that all of those recorded in registers after 1866, were indeed buried in what is now known as Bolton Street Cemetery.

The first burial service recorded in the earliest register took place on 17th May 1840, for a 3-year-old infant George Nash, son of James and Anne Nash. These three had arrived in Wellington on the “Bolton” on 21st April 1840. George’s funeral was conducted by the Revd. John F Churton who had also arrived on the same voyage.

Of the 992 burials recorded in the earliest register, 812 were not also included in the burial database listings for the Church of England Cemetery (informally known as “Bolton Street”). The 180 that were recorded in both the earliest register and the later burial list compilations had been added from inventories compiled from existing headstones and other grave identification records at various dates. This means 812 likely burials at Bolton Street were still missing. A very few of these have been identified as having been buried elsewhere, such as St James Churchyard in Lower Hutt. However, it was decided to add the remainder to our Bolton Street Cemetery database on the expectation that most of them were certainly buried in Bolton Street.

We have begun research on the 812 individuals recorded only in the earliest register to verify whether Bolton Street is their most likely resting place (from where they lived, the place of their deaths, and possible clues from early newspaper accounts). There is much work yet to be done!

These additions have taken the numbers of burials at Bolton Street Cemetery to over 9,000. But it can be assumed that there are significant numbers of non-Church of England burials for which there are no known records, perhaps in lost early registers of other church denominations. So we could suggest the total number of burials in all three cemeteries (Church of England, Public and Jewish) is in the order of 10,000.

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## DAFFODILS EMERGE TO BRIGHTEN YOUR WINTER DAYS

The speaker at our 2023 Annual General Meeting will be Clare Shearman (pictured on page 2) who is the senior landscape designer in the horticultural team at Wellington Botanic Garden. Clare's passion for garden design is *to have a blaze of colour and for the thrill of unexpected discovery* as shown in the flowering daffodils in Bolton Street Cemetery.

Clare is experienced in garden design with knowledge of heritage and hybrid bulbs and of how well daffodil plants might stand up to Wellington's blustery spring weather. Therefore, she is the ideal liaison person for the daffodil planting programme in the Bolton Street Cemetery. Any member wishing to discuss the future direction of this daffodils programme will be able to speak with Clare at the AGM on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> July (see page 1 for details).

The earliest daffodils appear in the cemetery near Robertson Way, the main walkway to the upper cemetery and the Seddon Memorial from The Terrace in Wellington City. It seems that daffodils were first planted in the earliest years of the cemetery although the bulbs are replaced every few years because of Wellington's climate. Every year the daffodils welcome the year's shortest day in mid-June.

Look out for the next group of daffodils to appear above the Dennis McGrath Bridge (straddling the motorway) in the section known as the *Judy Bale daffodil garden*. This area makes a quiet statement about clever garden design with its mix of assorted daffodil varieties that flower over an extended season. You will notice how long this flowering season is in this garden. Here you will see the first daffodils to emerge in this section of the cemetery which will brighten your winter days.

By early July the cemetery's daffodil collection will be flowering everywhere. Part of the delight of walking through the Wellington Botanic Garden and the Bolton Street Cemetery will be seeing what daffodils you can spot each week. This discovery of the unusual and the different, will continue until nearly November. Look out for daffodils to brighten the cemetery - and your day.

## TOURS

Last year the Friends led two tours during Heritage Week, plus several others. White cross grave markers were again set up for our ‘Anzac Challenge’ self-guided tour <https://boltoncemetery.org.nz/anzac-challenge-2020/> prior to Remembrance Day and this year’s Anzac Day.

We welcomed Barbara Mulligan to our guiding team. Barbara has been taking people on tours at Karori Cemetery for the previous ten years, so we are delighted she is now able to contribute her experience and cemetery knowledge to the Friends of Bolton Street Cemetery.

Tours at Karori feature people buried from 1890 onwards, so Barbara has been enjoying immersing herself in Wellington’s earlier years. She has developed a tour about some of the essential roles played by those buried in Bolton Street who contributed to the development of not only Wellington, but also New Zealand.

Wellington Anniversary weekend last January was a great opportunity to highlight city/national pioneers such as John Balmer, a member of the band of the 65th Regiment (“The Royal Tigers”). He was killed by a shark attack in Wellington Harbour on 22 January 1852. This tour, confined to easily accessible areas behind the Bolton Street Cemetery Museum, attracted more than 50 participants when repeated over three days.

Mother’s Day provided another opportunity for a tour, titled ‘Surprising Stories about Wonderful Women’. About a dozen people joined Barbara for a morning walk from the Seddon Memorial to the Museum, with stories along the way.

Barbara is currently planning a tour featuring the role of Rita Angus in the history of the cemetery, to be launched during Wellington Heritage Week in October.

Barbara has also set up and administers a Facebook page on behalf of the Friends. This allows the Friends to promote anything happening around or of interest to the cemetery, to promote tours and other activities such as working bees, and to reach an audience which relies on technology to gather information about activities and events. ## **PRESERVATION & PROMOTION OF CEMETERY HERITAGE**

The 2023 New Zealand Cemeteries and Crematoria Conference was held in Wellington in May. It brought together people managing or working in this area, especially those employed in Local Government. The Ministry of Culture and Heritage invited the Friends to submit a presentation on a theme related to heritage or education in cemeteries. Barbara Mulligan and Priscilla Williams delivered a joint presentation. Barbara was drawing on her significant experience as a guide in Karori Cemetery and then the initiator in forming the Friends of Karori Cemetery. Priscilla has been a member of the Friends of Bolton St Cemetery for about twenty years.

Priscilla talked about heritage in cemeteries, using for this presentation a definition of heritage as any graves or memorials over 100 years old. She noted a growing interest in New Zealand's old cemeteries and their preservation as part of our history. It was therefore important to preserve these early grave markers using acceptable conservation methods and to ensure where possible that they can be identified and their history recorded. She emphasised in particular, the importance of 19th C wooden grave markers, most of which have now been lost. Bolton St Cemetery has an outstanding collection of these, which have recently been preserved. She showed illustrations of the work done on these, both at Bolton St and in other NZ cemeteries.

Barbara's talk concentrated on the use of volunteers, especially Friends groups, in promoting interest in heritage items through tours and social media, these being activities which can raise finance to assist in restoration. She outlined ways in which communities could be better mobilised, supported and guided to maintain and enhance heritage values. Older cemeteries throughout New Zealand have received little support from the heritage sector, and cemetery owner/managers responses to community and volunteer-based initiatives have focussed primarily on health and safety issues. She highlighted the need to address the absence of frameworks or guidance for safeguarding the heritage held within aging cemeteries, which increases their vulnerability.

A field trip was held on the last day of the conference starting with a tour of Bolton Street Cemetery. On one of the coldest mornings of the year to date, about 50 participants turned out, guided by Barbara and Priscilla, to see at first hand our important heritage cemetery and the standard of restoration work which had been achieved. It was a special pleasure to end the tour in our newly designed exhibition space in the Bolton Street Cemetery Museum, located in lower Bolton St.

## PERFORMANCE REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

### PART I: STATEMENT OF SERVICE PERFORMANCE:

- The main focus of activities during the year was to work towards the installation of new displays for the Bolton Street Cemetery Museum, using the services of Trestle Creative to design and produce the new exhibition. This was achieved and the Museum re-opened on 28 October 2022.
- The Society held nine guided tours during the year, including two for Wellington's Heritage Week and three for the Wellington Anniversary Weekend. We also offered the self-guided WWI tour around Anzac Day, and for Remembrance Day in November.
- Working bees this year developed a successful strategy of focussing on different areas and scheduling several Sundays in succession for members to come along and continue where they left off last time. There were 11 well-attended working bees.
- We assist the WCC by identifying urgent repairs to heritage graves, and liaison on methods to be used. Last year's priority (conservation repairs to the Nancarrow grave brickwork) was delayed for a further year by the process of archaeological and other consents. Some smaller repairs were completed and we assisted with several private conservation projects on memorials.
- Our website's searchable burial database grew from about 8600 names to just over 9300. It was also further updated by adding about 1000 'age at death' entries for a new memorial book for the Museum. About 50 enquiries were answered with detailed research notes and photographs.
- Two issues of the Society's newsletter were published during the year.
- Many members volunteer their own time and skills to the Society's activities. In all, this amounted to an average of 120 hours per month – totalling over 1400 hours in 2022/23.

## SEDDON MEMORIAL BLESSING AND REINTERMENT

A Seddon Memorial Blessing and Reinterment ceremony held 27 May, marked completion of the major conservation programme as outlined in our last newsletter. It was attended by members of the extended Seddon family, staff from Ministry of Culture and Heritage Manatū Taonga, Friends of Bolton Street Cemetery, and the public.

It was officiated by Kaanihi Butler-Hare (Te Āti Awa), and Reverend Katie Lawrence (Acting Dean/Canon Precentor of Wellington Cathedral of St Paul). Twelve caskets of family members' ashes were re-interred inside the subterranean crypt. This contains three large sarcophagi for former Prime

Minister of New Zealand, Richard (King Dick) John Seddon, his wife Louisa Seddon and daughter Mary Stuart Hay. A small cross commemorates their son, Richard John Spotswood Seddon, who was killed in France in 1918.

Becky Masters-Ramsay (Manatū Taonga MCH Senior Adviser) and Tracey Hartley (Conservation Building Surveyor from Salmon Reed) each spoke about the memorial's five-year restoration.
